

Superintendent Column:

Greetings families and friends:

I hope that everyone has enjoyed the summer and opportunities to celebrate the season in our community. As with every year, we see the seasons change and our activities change. This includes the beginning of the school year. I am looking forward to the 2025-26 school year as we continue our work to educate and mentor our students for the future.

This year, the District will focus on our learning standards for math. We focused on reading and English Language Arts last year, which resulted in the identification of priority standards for the District that were aligned across grade levels with specific instructional scope and sequence for learning. This will provide clarity on what students need to know and the instruction that teachers will provide. That is the objective for math this year. We started to see the fruits of our work last year with reading and ELA with better understanding of standards, increased collegial discussions regarding instruction, and implementation of collaboration among teaching staff. This is hard work but extremely rewarding when we see the results of this work.

Another focus for the District is the continued growth of our professional learning community. The framework of a professional learning community is establishing opportunities for staff to collaborate on instructional practices, assess student learning, develop instructional interventions to support students with lagging skills, and share best practices for instruction. We have collectively made an effort to provide more time for teaching staff to work together to improve student learning and outcomes. This work will continue this year with more time to evaluate student learning and assessments, collaborate on specific student learning needs, and tailor interventions to meet the needs of students. I am looking forward to the continued growth and progress of our students and staff.

I would like to provide more clarification regarding the latest update on State and Federal funding for education. The governor and legislature passed the 2025-27 biennial budget this summer with the following changes to public education funding:

- 1. There is no increase to state per pupil aid. However, there was a shift in state aid based on property value. For the School District of Solon Springs, we will see a decrease of almost \$235,000 in state aid for the 2025-26 school year based on the increased property value assessments even though the school levy limit remains unchanged. Property owners will see higher property taxes to fund the District than in previous years due to the decrease in state aid.
- 2. Special education categorical aid based on medicaid reimbursement is scheduled to increase from 30-32% to 42% in 2025-26 and 45% in 2026-27. This won't have a significant impact for the District but it will provide more funds for special education.
- 3. Open enrollment payment per pupil will increase from \$8,962 in 2024-25 to \$10,102 in 2025-26 and \$11,030 in 2026-27. This will be beneficial for districts that have a positive open enrollment balance, with more coming into the District than leaving the District. The overall impact on the District is not very positive but there are definitely some benefits. As for federal funding, there were some concerns regarding the impounding of federal grant funds with the most significant impact being the impounding of the 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) grant that supports our before and after school programs. There was a fair amount of dialogue regarding this decision with Congressmen along with lawsuits submitted against the impounding of funds resulting in the release of these funds that were already appropriated. Our programs will continue to operate as it did last year but I anticipate that this topic will come back up for discussion in future years.

Finally, if you have been following Board meetings over the past few months, you will know that there has been some discussions regarding a facility study as the Board begins the process of considering a potential referendum for the District. The Board interviewed 4 companies and selected Market & Johnson to conduct a facility study to determine the overall condition of our building and facilities as well as how we are effectively using our current facilities. The objective is to complete a comprehensive report detailing concerns with our facilities and ways that we could better utilize our spaces to meet the needs of the District. It will also develop different ideas on how we could minimize new spaces to meet the additional needs not addressed with our current building and facilities. This information will be provided to families and the community in a timely fashion for review and community conversations that will be organized at a later time. Please stay tuned as we provide information on this process.

School bus safety is our highest priority. Behaviors that take the bus driver's attention off the road endanger

the safety of all students and staff on the bus. Riding the bus is a privilege. Please be courteous to others around you.

The school bus is considered an extension of the school environment, and as a result, students are expected to follow the same PBIS expectations: Safe, Respect, Responsible.

The following outlines specific expectations for riding the school bus:

- Immediately follow the directions of the driver.
- Refrain from fighting, harassment, bullying, intimidation, or horseplay.
- Sit in your own seat facing forward. "Sitting on your pockets"
- Do not throw any objects in the bus or outside the bus.
- Talk quietly and use appropriate language.
- Keep your arms, legs, and belongings to yourself.
- Refrain from vandalism or damaging the school bus.
- Do not bring any weapons or dangerous objects on the bus.

STUDENT RECORDS

(Board Policy 8330)

In order to provide appropriate educational services and programming, the Board of Education must collect, retain, and use information about individual students. Simultaneously, the Board recognizes the need to safeguard students' privacy and restrict access to students' personally identifiable information.


Except for data identified by policy as "directory data," student "personally identifiable information" includes, but is not limited to: the student's name; the name of the student's parent or other family members; the address of the student or student's family; a personal identifier, such as the student's social security number, student number, or biometric record; other indirect identifiers, such as the student's date of birth, place of birth, and mother's maiden name; other information that, alone or in combination, is linked or linkable to a specific student that would allow a reasonable person in the school community, who does not have personal knowledge of the relevant circumstances, to identify the student with reasonable certainty; or information requested by a person who the District reasonably believes knows the identity of the student to whom the education record relates.

The Board is responsible for the records of all students who attend or have attended schools in this District. Only records mandated by the State or Federal government and/or necessary and relevant to the function of the School District or specifically permitted by this Board will be compiled by Board employees.

In all cases, permitted, narrative information in student records shall be objectively-based on the personal observation or knowledge of the originator.

Student records shall be available only to students and their parents, eligible students, designated school officials who have a legitimate educational interest in the information, or to other individuals or organizations as permitted by law.

FREE AND REDUCED MEALS (Board Policy 8531)



The Board shall provide eligible children with breakfast and lunch at a reduced rate or at no charge to the student, as well as free milk for qualifying students.

Children, eligible for free or reduced-price meals, shall be determined by the criteria established by the Child Nutrition Program. These criteria are issued annually by the Federal government through the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction's (DPI) administration of the School Nutrition Programs.

The Board designates the Food Service Director to determine in accordance with Board standards, the eligibility of students for free and/or reduced-price meals.

The schools shall, at least once annually close to the beginning of the school year, notify all families of the availability, eligibility requirements, and/or application procedure for free and reduced-price meals by distributing an application to the family of each student enrolled in the school. The notice shall contain all information required by State and Federal regulation. Any student identified as homeless, a foster child, a runaway, a migrant, or who is enrolled in Head Start shall be considered eligible for free meals and free milk.

Students receiving free or reduced meals or milk shall not be subjected to any of the following actions related to their receipt of meal service:

- 1. the District shall not publish or otherwise publicize names of children receiving free or reduced meals or milk;
- 2. the District's meal service will not use special tokens or tickets that identify students as receiving free or reduced meals or milk;
- 3. no student shall be required to work or perform any service in order to receive food service;
- 4. students receiving free or reduced price meal service shall not be required to use a separate line or separate eating area, nor shall they be required to receive meals at a different time based on eligibility for the free or reduce program;
- 5. all students shall have the same choices for meals and milk regardless of whether the student is paying full price or receiving free or reduced meal service benefits.

The District Administrator shall regularly evaluate the free and reduced lunch program to determine whether the District or school may qualify for special assistance certification or Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) to reduce the paperwork burden on families qualifying for free and reduced meals. Any schools identified as CEP eligible shall be notified.

Childhood Vision

Information taken from Vision 101 For School-Based OT Practitioners By Jaime Spencer and Robert Constatine

Childhood vision facts:

- 1 in 4 school-aged children have a vision problem that can affect learning, behavior and development
- 79% of school-aged children have not visited an eye care provider in the past year
- 35% of school-aged children have never seen and eye care professional
- 40% of school-aged children who fail an initial vision screening do not receive the appropriate follow up care.

Signs of vision difficulties:


- Tilting head when reading
- Watery eye
- Poorly spaced letters when writing
- Rubbing eyes
- Headaches
- Poor attention
- Difficulty reading
- Squinting
- Covers one eye when reading
- May complain of words moving on the page or blurry vision

Vision difficulties can lead to academic problems:

- Poor reading skills
- Poor handwriting
- Difficulty with copying from a book or the board
- Visual motor integration difficulties
- Avoidance of near vision tasks such as writing and reading


Recommended eye exam frequency:

- First exam at 6 months
- Then at 3 years olf
- Annually ages 6-18 months



Each year the Lion's Club performs vision screenings at the school. If you receive a notification that your child failed a screen, please follow up with an optometrist or ophthalmologist. If you have questions on where to take your child or have a financial hardship please reach out as the Lion's Club works with local doctors to assist with getting the correct glasses for your child. There is also another program in Wisconsin called Prevent Blindness Wisconsin that can help.




Screen Time

New research reveals that excessive screen time use in toddlers is strongly linked to speech delays and slower white matter development in the brain. For every additional 30 minutes of handheld screen time, the risk of delayed speech spikes by 49%.

White matter is the brain's communication superhighway, essential for language, learning and focus. MRI scans show that too much passive screen exposure can hinder its growth, reducing the brain's ability to form connections between key regions. Toddlers learn best from real-world interactions, facial expressions, tones of voice, and back and forth conversations. Screens, especially passive viewing, replace these vital development experiences.

When screen time takes over, toddlers miss out on activities that nourish the brain, imaginative play, nature exploration and human connection. The result? Not only expressive speech delays, but increased frustration and behavioral issues and long term effects of literacy and learning. Lets give children the tools they need to speak, grow and thrive beyond the screen.






















Annual District Notices

CHILD FIND AND STUDENT SERVICES

The District must locate, identify, and evaluate all resident children with disabilities, including children with disabilities attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities. The school district has a special education screening program to locate and screen all children with suspected disabilities who are residents of the District and who have not graduated from high school. Upon request, the District will screen any resident child who has not graduated from high school to determine whether a special education referral is appropriate. STUDENT ANTI-HARASSMENT (Board Policy 5517)

Notice of the Board's policy on anti-harassment in the educational environment and the identity of the District's Compliance Officers will be posted throughout the District and published in any District statement regarding the availability of employment, staff handbooks, and general information publications of the District as required by Federal and State law and this policy.

NONDISCRIMINATION ON THE BASIS OF SEX IN EDUCATION PROGRAMS OR ACTIVITIES (Board Policy 2266)

The Board does not discriminate on the basis of sex (including sexual orientation or gender identity), in its education programs or activities, and is required by Title IX of the Education Amendments Act of 1972, and its implementing regulations, not to discriminate in such a manner. The requirement not to discriminate in its education program or activity extends to admission and employment. The Board is committed to maintaining an education and work environment that is free from discrimination based on sex, including sexual harassment.

The Board prohibits sexual harassment that occurs within its education programs and activities. When the District has actual knowledge of sexual harassment in its education program or activity against a person in the United States, it shall promptly respond in a manner that is not deliberately indifferent.

Pursuant to its Title IX obligations, the Board is committed to eliminating sexual harassment and will take appropriate action when an individual is determined responsible for violating this policy. Members of the School District community who commit Sexual Harassment are subject to the full range of disciplinary sanctions set forth in this policy. Third parties who engage in sexual harassment are also subject to the disciplinary sanctions listed in this policy. The Board will provide persons who have experienced Sexual Harassment ongoing supportive measures as reasonably necessary to restore or preserve access to the District's education programs and activities.

Complaints alleging sexual harassment and/or discrimination on the basis of sex are also covered by and subject to the investigation procedures in Board Policy 5517 - Student Anti-Harassment. Complaints not covered by this policy may still be governed by and subject to the procedures in Policy 5517 - Student Anti-Harassment.

ANNUAL NOTICE HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (Board Policy 5111.01)

The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless children and youth as:

Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, and includes children and youth who are:

- sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
- living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- living in emergency or transitional shelters
- abandoned in hospitals
- living in a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
- living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and
- migratory children who qualify as homeless because the children are living in circumstances described above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children or youth who may qualify according to the above criteria, the School District of Solon Springs provides the following assurances to parents and guardians of homeless children and youth and unaccompanied homeless youth:

- The child or youth shall be immediately enrolled and allowed to fully participate in school, even if unable to produce records normally required for enrollment (e.g., academic records, immunization and other required health records, proof of residency, or other documentation) or has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness.
- Homeless children and youths are not stigmatized or segregated because of their status as homeless and have full and equal educational and related opportunities.
- Meaningful opportunities to participate in the education of their children including special notices of events, parent-teacher conferences, newsletters, and access to student records.
- Immediate enrollment and transportation to the school of origin. "School of origin" means the school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled, including a preschool.
- Written explanation of any decisions related to school selection or enrollment made by the school, the local educational agency, or the State educational agency involved, including the rights of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied youth to appeal and receive prompt resolution of such decisions.


Unexcused Absences
