For instance, one area that makes Solon Springs so unique is that while most schools throughout the state have declining enrollments, ours is up over 20% in the past 6 years or so. Currently we have 322 enrolled students. It is anticipated that in the fall over 330 students will call themselves Eagles! An ever increasing number of students are attending Solon Springs through Open Enrollment.

At the end of June, I will be retiring with many wonderful memories about being fortunate enough to work here. I continue to be amazed at how this is community supports people when needs arise. 














# Student Council Leadership Conference in the Dells!


The Student Council members had an opportunity to attend a Leadership Conference in the Dells that taught us ways we can help support and create a positive school climate and culture.




## Senior Banners Displayed on Baldwin Avenue

## **Wolf Ridge Field Trip**

In May, fifth graders in Legacy and Montessori school traveled together to Wolf Ridge Environmental Learning Center in Finland, MN. They spent three days and two nights learning about Ojibway Heritage, Voyageur Life, Geology, and more! Students also challenge themselves on the high ropes course and indoor rock wall. This annual trip wraps up topics studied in fourth and fifth grade and gives students a great hands on experience! Thank you to everyone who helped to support this trip!









## Student Learning Projects in Eagles Academy

Each semester, students at Eagles Academy design and learn through a Student Learning Project (SLP). SLPs challenge students to plan a project around a topic and essential question they are interested in learning about. Together with their advisor, students design the project to include deep academic learning through core subjects such as English, math, social studies, and science. The project also often includes electives such as woodworking, computer science, and art. As students research their questions, they learn through internet research, contacting community members and professionals, and designing, experimenting, or experiencing something related to their topic. After much researching and writing about their project, as well as much reflection and revision, students present their research and projects to the larger community. Below is an article written about the students' Spring Project Showcase experience from the perspective of a student:

"I'm Elli Tyson and I am a sixth grader at Eagles Academy. This was my second project showcase. Our first project showcase was very chaotic but a lot of fun. I feel like this project showcase was a lot more organized only because a lot of us students knew what it was supposed to look like. We started preparing for the project showcase about a week and half before; we started with figuring out what we were going to put on our boards. The day of project showcase was a lot of fun. We had to move a lot of tables and chairs to have a good layout for presenting. Before project
