#### Superintendent's Column

Fall 2023

Greetings families and members of the Solon Springs community. The school year has gotten off to a good start for the School District of Solon Springs. Students and staff have gotten into a good routine and fall sports are quickly coming to an end with playoff and sectional competitions in view. Fall is always a time of fun, excitement, and celebration as we celebrate the harvest of the bountiful year and prepare for winter.



Just like the changing of the seasons, the District has seen a couple of changes in the past couple of months. In September, our highly revered vocal and general music teacher, Gretchen Molina, moved with her family to Florida. This move was difficult to take as a District, since she played a large part in the music and drama programs. However, we were fortunate to bring on board Brian Hill, who is an accomplished music educator with a great amount of experience working with students of all ages. We wish the Molina family all the best on their new adventure and we welcome Brian to the Eagles team.

#### **Academics**

This fall, the District moved to FastBridge as our academic screening assessment, replacing STAR. This screening assessment is given 3 times per year (September/October, January and March/April) for our students in 4K-8. The information from this assessment helps us determine what additional instruction students need and determine what interventions to provide, in order to boost student achievement. Staff have been learning how to administer the assessment and use the data collected. In the future, the data from this assessment as well as statewide assessments will be used to develop district plans to improve instruction. The objective is to improve student achievement, which is the main focus of the District.

#### Communication

The District is taking steps to be more transparent and provide information to the public in multiple ways. We have incorporated a part of BoardDocs that manages all of our Board and Committee meeting agendas and minutes. People are able to access this information through the District website and view this information whenever it is convenient. We are also going to be live streaming and recording board meetings on YouTube, which makes the meetings accessible to the public whenever convenient. We are continuing to provide this periodical on a quarterly basis instead of bimonthly. It will continue to have information about the District and highlight all of the great things we are doing. Also, I will be posting short videos on the District website to provide information on more pressing matters. Lastly, I will be hosting some community engagement events to provide opportunities for community members to dialogue with me on issues concerning the District. Our first event will occur on October 29 (See Below). Please stay tuned for future events. It is our objective to ensure that the families and community members of the District are in the know and actively involved in the District.

#### Safety

In the past couple of months, the District has been focused on safety. We have been very deliberate to train staff and be more prepared to react to adverse situations. We are committed to the safety of the students and staff in the District. We will continue to enhance our safety plan and training with the assistance of EMS, fire, law enforcement, and DHHS to ensure we have the best possible plan to address potential threats to the District. We will continue to keep you informed on our training events so both you and your students are prepared.

On Tuesday October 10th, the Eagles Academy students visited the Joseph E. Lord Land Allotment located on the east side of Lake St. Croix. Students were able to learn about the history of the Native American Allotment Land that has been in the Lord family for more than 130 years. Elders, Virginia Bartelt (Lord) 96 and Mary Ann Walt (Lord) 88 were on hand to answer questions about the land and local history including information about the old school house that still sits on the land, today. Students were treated to venison stew and wild rice hot dish that was prepared with wild rice that the students harvested at Cut-Away Dam, in September. The trip ended with a story and a couple of songs played on a Native American flute by Roselyn Vier and a hike down to the site of a traditional Native American camp on Lake St. Croix. What an amazing experience for all involved!

At the end of August, wild rice ripens for harvest. The 7th grade Environmental Education Exploratory class learned about the history, culture, and ecology of wild rice. The Ojibwe word for wild rice is *manoomin*. It is highly nutritious and has always



been a significant food resource of the Ojibwa diet. On Monday, September 11th, students took to the river to practice their own skill at wild ricing. They collected around 18 pounds of rice. Once processed, students will have a chance to cook and eat the wild rice they collected. Thank you to volunteers (Chuck Walt, Bob Maas, Jeff Jamar) who joined us in sharing their harvest experience with students. The weather was perfect and the river provided us with a unique treat!



#### 2023 Golf Scramble

ALICE proactive strategies. Adoption of a lockdown-only response has been deemed insufficient by the Department of Education, independent researchers, and law enforcement. Society is dictating we change our thought process on safety and ALICE optionsbased strategies will help increase school safety. We found the ALICE strategies to be the most adopted by schools across the country, and ALICE training helps to maintain our compliance with the federally recommended guidelines.

ALICE empowers individuals to participate in their survival using proactive options-based responses. ALICE is an acronym for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate. I want to assure you that we went to great lengths to understand exactly what each option entails. We are very comfortable with all the ALICE proactive strategies to empower our students and staff to be safe until help arrives. We will implement these safety strategies in age and ability appropriate ways.

Our staff will be trained on the ALICE strategies through in-person, online, and hands-on training with our local ALICE-Certified Instructors. We are very pleased with the comprehensive roll-out procedure ALICE Training Institute has in place and believe this is the right choice for our students, staff, schools, and the community.

Training for the 2023-2024 school year will begin with an all staff training on October 13, 2023. Student training will occur in the spring of 2024. Families will be notified prior to the student training.





On November 13th, middle and high school students will be traveling to Northwood. Jeff Olson, father of Daniel Olson and Ishpeming High School's head football coach, is working to reduce the stigma surrounding mental illness. Jeff has taught in the public school system for 30



years and has coached Football and other sports for 37 years. Jeff has also been Ishpeming's Head Basketball Coach and has helped coach track for many years. Jeff, his wife Sally, and four children, have endured the pain of a loved one battling severe depression and anxiety ultimately leading to the suicide of their son Daniel at the age of 19. Jeff has spent the past 2 years traveling to different schools and communities around the Midwest speaking on anxiety, depression, and suicide and presenting the Do It For Daniel documentary about his son's and family's struggles with this medical illness.

#### What is Truancy?

Dear Families and Guardians:

The school year has begun and Solon Springs staff has exciting plans and high expectations for your child's learning. We know that you also have many hopes and dreams for your child's success in school and beyond.

To make sure those hopes and dreams are realized, we want to ask for your commitment to making sure your child attends school every day possible this school year. There is clear evidence: children with good attendance are more likely to be successful in school. High attendance rates are linked to high student achievement. This is true for every grade – elementary, middle, and high school students.

#### Every day counts!

Missing school even 10% of the time has a significant negative impact on reading and math achievement as children progress through school.

Students with good attendance performed better in math and reading. Children who had good attendance in Kindergarten through Grade 2 were more than twice as likely to score proficient on state math tests by the time they reached Grade 8 as their peers who missed more school. In reading, there were similar results

Good attendance starts early. Research has shown that the attendance habits established from the start of school through Grade 2 have lasting effects on students throughout their education: children with high attendance in the early grades continue to have good attendance; and students with low attendance in the early grades are more likely to have low attendance—and lower academic performance—throughout their elementary and middle school years.

You are your child's most influential teacher and we are asking for your support in helping your child get into class on time every day. Your child needs to be in school and engaged in learning to reach his or her full potential. Yet, we realize that every family faces challenges. Let us know if we can help and we will do our best to help you and your family ensure that your child's school attendance stays on track.

Thank you for all you do to support your child's school success and well-being, as well as our school. I look forward to working with you this year and to having your child learn and grow Solon Springs!


On 10/12, our high school boys team took home the plaque making them Conference title champs 7 out of the last 8 years! The high school girls team finished as Conference Runner Ups this year!


