

sacrifices you've made for our country.





Greetings families and friends:

### **Special Dates & Board Presentations**

- **District and School Report Cards:** The annual **School and District Report Cards** from the state were open to Districts for review in September. However they have been embargoed from public release. They will be released on **November 11**. These results will be formally presented to the School Board at the meeting on **December 3**. These report cards provide a snapshot of the District's academic growth and achievement as well as participation in other career planning activities with students. The publicly released report cards will be posted on the District website after the presentation to the Board on December 3.
- Veterans Day Program: The District invited the community to join our annual Veterans Day Program on Tuesday, November 11, at 10:00 AM. It was a great event to show our support and appreciation for all veterans who have served our country. Veterans and family members of veterans were recognized for their commitment and sacrifice for our country. The Band, Choir, and presenters did an excellent job with performing.
- Family Math and Reading Day: Last year, the District hosted a Family Math and Reading Day that coincided with Dr. Suess Week and Read Across America Week, which is the first week in March. We are planning to host this event again with a tentative date of March 6. There will be learning stations to focus on math and reading skills, facilitated by community members, businesses, staff members and students. More information will be sent out as we get closer to this date.

### **Facilities & Building Planning**

- Facility Study Update: The results of the comprehensive Facility Study were presented to the School Board on Monday, October 27 at the regular Board meeting. The Board is currently reviewing the data to inform long-range capital improvement decisions.
- Building Needs Assessment: The next phase of facility planning will begin shortly with a detailed Building Needs Assessment. We are partnering with Market & Johnson and River Valley Architects (RVA) for this crucial stage of planning. We will have the opportunity for community members to provide feedback on the building needs assessment to determine the facility and space priorities for the District in the years to come. Board members and District leadership met with Market & Johnson and RVA on the evening of November 20 to provide input on facility needs. Teachers and staff met with them on November 21 to gather their input on facility needs. More information and confirmation of the date for a community meeting on this process will be provided in the near future.

### **Curriculum & Standards**

Significant progress has been made in reviewing and aligning District instructional materials with state standards in core areas.

- **ELA/Reading Essential Standards:** Last year, the District focused on identifying the essential standards for ELA/Reading. We are continuing the work of finalizing the scope and sequence of instruction to maximize learning and gain efficiencies with instruction.
- Math Essential Standards: This year, our team has begun the process of identifying the essential standards for mathematics across the district. This identification provides a focused framework to guide instruction, assessment, and resource allocation to ensure all students master the most critical mathematical concepts. This should also make our instruction more efficient for accelerating student learning.

Thank you for your continued support of the School District of Solon Springs. We are proud to serve this community and are excited about the progress we are making together. As always, GO EAGLES!

## **Childhood Vision**

We would like to send a THANK YOU to the Solon Springs Lion's Club Members who provided vision screening to all of our elementary students on October 16th and 17th. This is such a valuable asset to our community and students.

Thank you for taking time to make sure our students are seeing the best they can in order to soar like eagles academically! If your child did not pass the vision screening a letter was sent home. A follow up appointment with an optometrist or ophthalmologist is recommended.

If you have questions on where to take your child or have a financial hardship please reach out as the Lion's Club works with local doctors to assist with getting the correct glasses for your child. There is also another program in Wisconsin called Prevent Blindness Wisconsin that can help.

Information taken from Vision 101 For School-Based OT Practitioners By Jaime Spencer and Robert Constatine

#### **Childhood vision facts:**

- 1 in 4 school-aged children have a vision problem that can affect learning, behavior and development
- 79% of school-aged children have not visited an eye care provider in the past year
- 35% of school-aged children have never seen and eye care professional
- 40% of school-aged children who fail an initial vision screening do not receive the appropriate follow up care.

#### Signs of vision difficulties:

- Tilting head when reading
- Watery eye
- Poorly spaced letters when writing
- Rubbing eyes
- Headaches
- Poor attention
- Difficulty reading
- Squinting
- Covers one eye when reading
- May complain of words moving on the page or blurry vision

### Vision difficulties can lead to academic problems:

- Poor reading skills
- Poor handwriting
- Difficulty with copying from a book or the board
- Visual motor integration difficulties
- Avoidance of near vision tasks such as writing and reading


### Recommended eye exam frequency:

- First exam at 6 months
- Then at 3 years olf
- Annually ages 6-18 months

If your child has received a prescription for glasses, please notify the classroom teacher and assist in encouraging your child to wear their glasses during the day at school. This will help set your child up for academic success, reduce fatigue as well as build confidence in your child's skills.

Each year the Lion's Club performs vision screenings at the school. If you receive a notification that your child failed a screen, please follow up with an optometrist or ophthalmologist. If you have questions on where to take your child or have a financial hardship please reach out as the Lion's Club works with local doctors to assist with getting the correct glasses for your child. There is also another program in Wisconsin called Prevent Blindness Wisconsin that can help.

# Big Top Field Experience


